3. Inspect for hazards and report them or correct them.
4. Know warning signals and signs - and obey them.
5. Pay attention to the job you are doing.
6. Pay attention to what others are doing nearby - particularly forklifts and other dangerous machines.
7. Stack and store materials so that they're secure and stable.

So as to guarantee a safe warehouse, workers should adhere to good housekeeping regulations. Basic rules for housekeeping involves keeping the aisles and floors clear of items such as cords and wires. Never perch objects insecurely on a surface. When spills occur, clean up at once. Dispose of garbage in right containers. Keep sprinklers, fire exits and fire extinguishers accessible. Put box cutters and various sharp tools away instantly after using. Report tripping hazards like for instance loose or damaged flooring.
